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FIRST EXTRAORDINARY SESSION ACTS

The effective date for acts of the 94th General Assembly that were considered by the General Assembly during the First Extraordinary Session and that do not contain an emergency clause or a specified effective date is December 14, 2023.

CRIMINAL LAW AND PROCEDURE

SENTENCING

Felony with a Firearm

ACT 2 (SB6) and ACT 8 (HB1006) are identical acts that clarify that Arkansas Code § 16-90-120(e)(1), concerning the minimum time a person must serve of his or her enhanced sentence before being eligible for early release when he or she received an enhanced sentence for employing a firearm while committing or escaping from a felony, applies to offenses committed on or after July 2, 2007, but before January 1, 2024, and Arkansas Code § 16-90-120(g), concerning the ineligibility of a person for early release for an enhanced sentence for employing a firearm while committing or escaping from a felony, applies to sentencing for offenses committed on or after January 1, 2024. The acts are effective on and after January 1, 2024.

EDUCATION - GENERAL

FACILITIES

Exterior Doors Required To Be Closed and Locked

ACT 3 (SB4) and ACT 9 (HB1005) are identical acts that amend Arkansas Code § 20-22-1011(a), concerning fire drills, to remove inconsistent language and clarify that all public and private schools and all educational institutions shall keep all exterior doors closed and locked during school hours with the exception of transition times. The acts declare an emergency and are effective on and after September 14, 2023.

STUDENTS - GENERALLY

School Choice Programs - Eligibility for Additional Funds

ACT 5 (SB5) amends the definition of a "qualified student" under the Philanthropic Investment in Arkansas Kids Program Act to include a student with a disability identified under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act and creates an exception to the enrollment requirement for a first-time recipient under the Philanthropic Investment in Arkansas Kids Program Act for a student with a disability identified under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act. The act requires that a student participating in the Arkansas Children's Educational Freedom Account Program who participated in the Succeed Scholarship Program during the 2022-2023 school year receive one hundred percent (100%) of the prior year's statewide foundation funding amount allocated per student. The act declares an emergency and is effective on and after September 14, 2023.

FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT

EXEMPTIONS

Records Concerning Security Services

ACT 7 (SB10) adds communications concerning certain security-related duties to the items compiled or possessed by the Division of Arkansas State Police that are confidential and not subject to disclosure under the Freedom of Information Act of 1967. The act also expands the items that are considered confidential and not subject to disclosure under the Freedom of Information Act of 1967 to include data, records, surveillance footage, security procedures, emergency plans, and other information compiled or possessed by the division concerning the safety and security of the Governor and his or her family and the State Capitol Building and State Capitol grounds. The act requires the division to submit to the Legislative Council a quarterly report that identifies categorized expenditures incurred by the Executive Protection Detail for services provided to the Governor. The act adds an additional exemption to the Freedom of Information Act of 1967 to include records that reflect the planning or provision of security services provided to constitutional officers, members of the General Assembly, and state appellate court judges. The act also specifies that it does not limit the ability of Arkansas Legislative Audit to report information it obtains to the Arkansas General Assembly. The section of the act expanding the items that are considered confidential and not subject to disclosure by the division and the section of the act creating an additional exemption to the Freedom of Information Act of 1967 for records that reflect the planning or provision of security services provided to the Governor are retroactive to June 1, 2022. The act declares an emergency and is effective on and after September 14, 2023.

PUBLIC FINANCE

REVENUE STABILIZATION

Arkansas Reserve Fund Set-Aside

ACT 1 (HB1004) and ACT 11 (SB1) are identical acts that create the Arkansas Reserve Fund Set-Aside as a sub-fund in the Restricted Reserve Fund and transfers seven hundred ten million six hundred twelve thousand five hundred eight dollars (\$710,612,508) of surplus funds to the Arkansas Reserve Fund Set-Aside. The acts allow the Chief Fiscal Officer of the State to request the release of funds from the Arkansas Reserve Fund Set-Aside after submitting a request demonstrating the need for the release and receiving approval by a two-thirds vote of the Arkansas Legislative Council or, if the General Assembly is in session, the Joint Budget Committee, and the acts allow funds to be released to one (1) or more general revenue operating funds or fund accounts, the Miscellaneous Agencies Fund Account, and the State Central Services Fund. The acts further provide that funds released and transferred from the Arkansas Reserve Fund Set-Aside to any general revenue fund cannot exceed the total Revenue Stabilization Act allocation when combining the amount of the set-aside funds released with the general revenue funding received through the Revenue Stabilization Law.

STATE AGENCIES, BOARDS, AND COMMISSIONS

GENERALLY

Prohibition on Mandatory COVID-19 Vaccine Requirements

ACT 4 (SB3) and ACT 10 (HB1002) are identical acts that prohibit the state, a state agency or entity, and a political subdivision of the state from mandating a vaccine or immunization for coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19) or any subvariants of coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19), or both, or discriminating or coercing an individual for refusing to receive a vaccine or immunization for coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19) or any subvariants of coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19), or both. The acts require the Department of Health to maintain information and data on any potential risk and harms associated with the administration of the vaccine or immunization for coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19) and any subvariants of coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19) and make the information and data publicly available. The acts require approval by Legislative Council to mandate or require a vaccine or immunization for coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19) or any subvariants of coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19), or both, if the state, a state agency or entity, a political subdivision of the state, or a state or local official determines that necessary federal funding is dependent upon an individual receiving a vaccine or immunization for coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19) or any subvariants of coronavirus 2019 (COVID-19), or both. The acts declare an emergency and are effective on and after September 14, 2023.

TAXES

INCOME TAX

Rate Reduction - One-Time Inflationary Relief Tax Credit

ACT 6 (SB8) reduces the top income tax rate for individuals, trusts, and estates to four and fourtenths percent (4.4%), reduces the top income tax rate for domestic and foreign corporations to four and eight-tenths percent (4.8%), and provides that the rate reductions for individuals, trusts, estates, and corporations will be effective for tax years beginning on or after January 1, 2024. The act also creates a one-time inflationary relief income tax credit of one hundred fifty dollars (\$150) for certain individual taxpayers and three hundred dollars (\$300) for certain taxpayers filing a joint return and provides that the income tax credit is effective for the tax year beginning January 1, 2023. The act declares an emergency and is effective on and after September 14, 2023.
