For the Year Ended June 30, 2009

This report has been prepared by the Division of Legislative Audit to provide an overview of how State education funds are distributed to school districts and others. ACADEMIC IMPROVEMENT TRAINING

Funds totaling \$500,000 were distributed between state educational organizations (\$316,000) and educational cooperatives (\$184,000). These funds provided research based materials and professional development to Arkansas teachers and administrators in their efforts to develop, initiate and evaluate student academic improvement plans. Funding focused on providing teachers with reading/writing, math, and science intervention training. In addition, funds were used to provide leadership training for building the capacity of administrators and teacher leaders through professional development to select, implement, and evaluate interventions that increase student academic improvement.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT INCENTIVE

The Advanced Placement Incentive program was appropriated \$825,000 for the 2008-2009 school year. This program provided support to establish Advanced Placement (AP) courses that are easily accessible and would prepare students for admission to, and success in, a postsecondary educational environment. The AP courses and exams provide high school students the opportunity to earn college credit at most colleges and universities. The program paid \$687,600 for professional development support for AP and Pre-AP teachers. One hundred forty-six (146) AP courses were awarded one-time only grants of up to \$1,000 for equipment and materials.

ALTERNATIVE LEARNING

School districts were required to provide an alternative learning environment (ALE) for students who demonstrated an inability to function in the standard learning environment. The ALE program provided educational programs to eligible students in alternative classroom settings, as well as additional services to meet the needs of this group of at-risk students. The Department of Education calculated ALE funds in the 2008-2009 school year by multiplying \$4,063 by the number of identified ALE students enrolled during the previous school year, pursuant to Arkansas law and Department of Education Rules.

ALTERNATIVE PAY

The Alternative Pay program, also known as the Rewarding Excellence in Achievement Program (REAP), was appropriated \$2,500,000 in fiscal year 2009. REAP was a pilot program that afforded public school districts and public charter schools the opportunity to develop alternative teacher compensation plans tailored to the public school district's or public charter school's needs to accomplish the following:

- Provide incentives that will encourage teachers to improve their knowledge and instructional skills in order to improve student learning;
- Recruit and retain highly qualified teachers;
- Encourage highly qualified teachers to undertake challenging assignments;
- Support teachers' roles in improving students' educational achievements; and
- Inform policymakers regarding the potential of a restructured teacher professional pay system to improve student achievement across the state.

For the 2008-2009 school year, the Department of Education selected the REAP plans of two districts and distributed \$807,907.

ARKANSAS EASTER SEALS

This program funded the cost of educational services provided by the Easter Seal Society to children ages 3 to 21 who have orthopedic and/or communicative disorders. This funding reduced the amount that local school districts had to pay for these educational services and also qualifies the facility as "state supported" so that federal funds were available to further reduce the cost to local school districts. The Easter Seals of Arkansas program was appropriated \$193,113 for the 2008-09 school year, and the total amount was paid in monthly installments of approximately \$16,093.

ARKANSAS LEADERSHIP ACADEMY AND MASTER PRINCIPAL

Created by the State Legislature in 1991, the Arkansas Leadership Academy was formed in order to provide leadership for education reform in Arkansas. The Academy brings together partners from business, higher education, professional associations, educational cooperatives and governmental agencies. It provided a variety of leadership development programs for principals, teachers, partners and other leaders including year-long residential programs. The Arkansas Leadership Academy program was appropriated \$1,490,000 for the 2008-2009 school year. Distributions totaling \$900,000 were made to the University of Arkansas from the Department of Education Fund (EGA) for the Arkansas Leadership Academy School Support Program through which the Arkansas Leadership Academy, in collaboration with the Department of Education, provided support to schools or school districts designated as being in school improvement (\$300,000) and for general operations (\$600,000). The Public School Fund (JAA) provided \$500,000 to the University of Arkansas for the master school principal program and bonus distributions totaling \$72,000 to eight master principals who had completed the requirements of the program.

ARKANSAS/STRIVE PROGRAM

This program placed middle, junior high and senior high school science, math and computer teachers into summer research positions in industries, businesses, government agencies, universities, research facilities and nonprofit organizations. The purpose of the program was to provide teachers with hands-on, real-world research experiences that expanded their scientific and technological knowledge and helped teachers develop inquiry-based and problem-based lessons from their summer research experiences that they could use in the classroom.

ARKANSAS TEACHER HOUSING DEVELOPMENT FOUNDATION

The purpose of the Arkansas Teacher Housing Development Foundation was to develop, implement and administer housing incentive programs to recruit and retain high performing teachers in high priority school districts. A high priority district was defined as having at least 80% free lunches and 1,000 or fewer students. For the 2008-2009 school year, \$100,000 was appropriated and paid directly to the Arkansas Teacher Housing Development Foundation.

ASSESSMENT/END OF LEVEL TESTING

This program funded grants to develop and implement alternative assessments required by No Child Left Behind, End-of-Course Exams, and Augmented Benchmark Exams, including a payment to the Dawson Educational Service Cooperative for the development and delivery of the annual School Performance Report for the 2008-2009 school year.

AT RISK

At Risk refers to students who are at-risk of failing or are not performing at their academic/grade level and/or developmental age level. Factors for being at-risk can include socio-economic factors, disciplinary concerns, low academic performance, high absenteeism and Limited English Proficiency. Local school districts, education service cooperatives and other service providers, as identified by the Arkansas Department of Education (ADE), were eligible to receive funding through a grant process that addressed academic achievement of students at-risk. The total amount of funds distributed was determined by the ADE State Board. For the 2008-2009 school year, \$3,784,854 was paid to various local school districts and education service cooperatives. These funds were for the College Preparatory Enrichment Program (CPEP), which was a summer college preparatory enrichment program for students who scored less than the minimum score of 19 on the ACT test as set by the State Board of Higher Education.

BETTER CHANCE GRANTS

Arkansas Better Chance Grants were administered by the Division of Child Care and Early Childhood Education of the Department of Human Services for the purpose of serving educationally deprived children ages birth through 5 years old, excluding kindergarten. Within the Arkansas Better Chance Program is the Arkansas Better Chance for School Success (ABCSS) Program, which funds innovative and developmentally appropriate early childhood programs for educationally deprived children ages 3 and 4. For the 2008-2009 school year, the distribution of funds was based on \$4,745 per child for classroom-based programs and \$1,709 per child for home-visiting programs. Total appropriation in fiscal year 2009 was \$111,000,000, of which \$109,357,339 was distributed to school districts, education cooperatives, institutions of higher education, state agencies, individuals and other organizations. The program served a total of 25,096 children in Arkansas in 2008-2009.

COOPERATIVE EDUCATION TECHNICAL CENTERS OPERATIONS

Technology Coordinators in the Education Service Cooperatives assisted local school districts by providing technology training, advising school districts in software/hardware purchases and overseeing technology laboratories. The maximum amount of funds available to each of the State's fifteen (15) education service cooperatives and the Pulaski County School District was set by the State Board of Education. For the 2008-2009 school year, the maximum amount was \$75,000.

COURT ORDERED DESEGREGATION

Funds were disbursed by the ADE for desegregation expenses as required by court ordered settlement agreements. The amount appropriated for the 2008–2009 school year was \$69,840,259. Disbursements were based on a series of formulas. Grant payments for the 2008-2009 school year were \$68,217,156 and included the following: \$36,751,147 to Little Rock School District, \$10,260,076 to the North Little Rock School District, \$20,440,763 to the Pulaski County Special School District, \$472,670 to the Camden-Fairview School District, \$92,500 for the Magnet Review Committee, and \$200,000 for the Office of Desegregation Monitoring.

DEBT SERVICE FUNDING SUPPLEMENT

This aid, also known as Bonded Debt Assistance, was provided to school districts to offset some of the existing debt burden incurred and to increase the amount of local revenue available for the maintenance and operation of schools. Bonded Debt Assistance funds were to be used solely for the payment of bonded debt.

Pursuant to ACA §6-20-2503, the following calculation was used to determine the Bonded Debt Assistance. The calculation was based on the Principal and Interest Payment Schedule in effect and on file with the Arkansas Department of Education (ADE) on January 1, 2005. This amount was reduced by 10% for purposes of calculating debt service funding supplement. If a school district demonstrated to the Commission for Arkansas Public School Academic Facilities and Transportation (the "Commission") that all or a portion of the 10% reduction in its scheduled debt payment was attributable to the support of academic facilities, the Commission reversed all or a portion of the 10% reduction by a percentage proportionate to the amount attributable to academic facilities. The remaining 90% (or greater if a percentage was reversed) of the principal and interest payment was divided by the total assessed value of the district and multiplied by 1,000 to calculate the required debt service mills. This product was multiplied by the State Wealth Index, multiplied by the prior year three-quarter Average Daily Membership, and multiplied by a funding factor of \$18.03.

These funds were paid on or before August 1 and February 1 of each year. If a district qualified for Bonded Debt Assistance, the amount of aid was not changed as a result of refunding bonds outstanding in effect and on file with the ADE on January 1, 2005. As the amount of state financial assistance decreases, resulting from reductions in principal and interest payments, bond payoff, and increases in property assessments, the Commission distributes savings to the Educational Facilities Partnership Fund (EFP), in accordance with rules promulgated by the Commission. The amount of savings transferred in fiscal year 2009 to the Educational Facilities Partnership Fund (EFP) was \$8,682,945.

DECLINING ENROLLMENT

This program provided additional funding to school districts with a prior year Average Daily Membership (ADM) that was less than the ADM of the year prior to the previous year. Funding was equal to the difference between the average of the ADM for the two immediately preceding years and the ADM for the previous school year multiplied by \$5,789, the amount of foundation funding for 2008-2009. Additionally, any appropriated and available funds for declining enrollment funding that remained after the initial distributions would be prorated and distributed equally to school districts that qualified for both declining enrollment funding and special needs isolated funding. There were no declining enrollment funds remaining in 2008-2009 after the initial distributions.

DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION SCHOOL DISTRICT

ACA §12-29-304 provided that the cost of running the Department of Correction School District be borne by the Department of Correction and the Department of Education. During the 2008-2009 school year, \$5,147,675 was appropriated and disbursed for the Arkansas Department of Correction School District.

DISTANCE LEARNING

Distance Learning is an educational process used to provide instruction to Arkansas students. The primary purpose of providing distance learning technologies is to assist school districts in receiving advanced high school courses, advanced placement courses, enriched course content, or other academic courses not otherwise available in the school district.

EARLY CHILDHOOD SPECIAL EDUCATION

This program provided special education services for an estimated 9,000 three to five year old preschool children with disabilities. This program also served as state Medicaid match for physical, occupational and speech therapy services. A portion of the appropriation was used to provide for partial reimbursement of 16 Early Childhood Coordinators and certain other program coordination costs. Funds were distributed to sub-recipients in the 2008-2009 school year based on headcounts at approximately \$1,600 per child.

ECONOMIC EDUCATION

The objective of this program is to increase the economic literacy of PreK-12 students by providing economic and personal finance education and training to teachers in Arkansas. The appropriation of \$350,000 was distributed in the 2008-2009 school year to the Arkansas Council on Economic Education (now conducting business as Economics Arkansas), a private, non-profit organization providing certified professional development for K-12 teachers.

EDUCATION RENEWAL ZONES

The Arkansas Education Renewal Zones (ERZ) was a state initiative to identify and implement educational and management strategies to improve public school performance and student academic achievement. Through this initiative, regionalized ERZs provided for collaboration among Arkansas' schools, especially smaller schools, while helping to concentrate and coordinate resources of institutions of higher education, regional education service cooperatives and other service providers. The Arkansas Department of Education, Division of ERZ provided funding of \$1,271,766 for the 2008-2009 school year to institutions of higher education to support the implementation of the regional ERZs.

EDUCATION SERVICE COOPERATIVES

The 15 educational service cooperatives around the State facilitated the sharing of resources and services between local school districts and provided the core support system for professional development. Each cooperative received four quarterly payments in the 2008-2009 school year of \$102,155.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEARNERS

This program served school districts with language minority students assessed as limited in their English proficiency. Most of these students were at the beginning stages of acquiring English. Funding was provided to assist with securing specially-trained staff, instructional materials and/or training. School districts received grants in the 2008-2009 school year based on the district's Limited English Proficiency (LEP) headcount at \$293 per LEP student.

GENERAL FACILITIES FUNDING

These funds were distributed in accordance with ACA §6-20-2503(e). Beginning in fiscal year 2005-2006, school districts received state financial assistance equal to the General Facilities Funding the school district received or would have received under the Supplemental School District Funding Act of 2003 (ACA 6-20-2401 et seq. [repealed]) during fiscal year 2004-2005. After fiscal year 2005-2006, this funding began a phase out by reducing the amount received by a school district by one-tenth of the 2005-2006 amount each year over a ten-year period with the savings distributed through the Educational Facilities Partnership Fund (EFP). The amount of savings transferred in fiscal year 2008-2009 to the Educational Facilities Partnership Fund (EFP) was \$2,437,527. Prior to fiscal year 2005-2006, a school district's expenditure of General Facilities Funding was restricted to the purchase of school buses, furniture, equipment and computer software, or for the renovation or repair to existing facilities. Beginning in fiscal year 2005-2006, the use of General Facilities Funding was unrestricted.

GIFTED AND TALENTED

This program provided salary support for Gifted and Talented supervisors in the education service cooperatives, a contribution to Hendrix College for the Arkansas Governor's School, awards for winners of the Outstanding Gifted and Talented Award Program, and a contribution to Arkansas for Gifted and Talented Education.

GRANTS TO SCHOOL DISTRICTS

This payment was made for educating students in North Arkansas who could not get to their assigned district because Bull Shoals Lake separated them from their district, which would require a round trip of more than 35 miles. Act 229 of 2007 appropriated \$50,000 to be paid in the 2008-2009 school year to the Ozark Mountain School District.

HIGH PRIORITY DISTRICT TEACHER RECRUITMENT/RETENTION

As authorized by ACA §6-17-811, these grants provided teacher bonuses as incentives for recruitment and retention in high-priority districts. A high-priority district was one having at least 80% free lunches and 1,000 or fewer students. "Teachers" were defined as those working directly with students 70% of their time in a classroom setting, including guidance counselors and librarians.

For all newly signed teachers to high-priority districts, a one-time signing bonus of \$4,000 was paid at the completion of a full year of teaching and a \$3,000 retention bonus was paid at the end of each of the next two subsequent years if the teacher continued teaching in the same high-priority district. A newly signed teacher was also eligible for a \$2,000 retention bonus, which was paid at the end of the fourth, and each subsequent year, if the teacher continued teaching in the same high-priority district or another high-priority district. For all teachers not newly signed to work in the district, a \$2,000 retention bonus was paid at the end of each year if the teacher continued to work in a high-priority district.

HOME SCHOOL TESTING

This program paid for the administration of norm-referenced achievement tests for home school students, as required by ACA §6-15-504. A grant of \$150,000 was made in the 2008-2009 school year to the Arch Ford Education Service Cooperative who administered the testing for the State. An additional \$100,000 was distributed for more personnel and to improve the implementation of home school testing information.

HUMAN DEVELOPMENT CENTER EDUCATION AID

This program provided funding for educational services to the children in the State's Human Development Centers. Act 229 of 2007 appropriated \$526,150 and was fully disbursed to the Department of Human Services

INTERVENTION BLOCK GRANTS

Local school districts, education service cooperatives, institutions of higher education, and other organizations were eligible to apply for an intervention block grant. These grants, totaling \$137,000 were used to encourage parental involvement through the following four (4) student competitions: Arkansas Governor's Quiz Bowl Association (\$100,000), Creativity in Arkansas (\$13,500), State History Day Competition (\$10,000) and Arkansas Destination Imagination (\$13,500).

ISOLATED FUNDING

Because of location or geographic barriers, some districts contained an area that was not able to share resources or had unusual transportation needs. This area, with an Average Daily Membership (ADM) of less than 350, was termed "isolated school area" and received additional funding. The funding was distributed in the 2008-2009 school year based, in part, upon the prior year three-quarter ADM of the isolated school area multiplied by the Per Student Isolated Funding Amount for the isolated school area as prescribed by ACA §6-20-603.

NATIONAL BOARD OF PROFESSIONAL TEACHING STANDARDS

This program encouraged teachers to seek certification by the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards by competitively awarding the \$2,500 application fee and up to 3 days of substitute teacher pay. A \$5,000 initial bonus was awarded during the school year in which the individual first obtained the National Board certification and a yearly bonus of \$5,000 was awarded to certified teachers in each of years two (2) through ten (10) of the 10-year life of the certificate. Funding of \$90,400 was also distributed to designated candidate "support centers" at various school districts, education service cooperatives, or institutions of higher education to assist candidates with the National Board certification process. Support center location funding was based on candidate distribution throughout the state. If a teacher does not achieve certification during the required three years, they must refund all State funds expended on their behalf. At the end of the 2008-2009 school year, the amount due back was \$116,810.

NATIONAL SCHOOL LUNCH STUDENT FUNDING

This program provided funding for those students from low socio-economic backgrounds, as indicated by the eligibility for free or reduced-price meals under the National School Lunch (NSL) Act, as reported on October 1 of each year and submitted to the Department of Education.

For the 2008-2009 school year, NSL student funding was as follows:

- (A) For school districts in which 90% or greater of the enrolled students are NSL students, funding was \$1,488;
- (B) For school districts in which at least 70% but less than 90% of the enrolled students are NSL students, funding was \$992; and
- (C) For school districts in which less than 70% of the enrolled students are NSL students, funding was \$496.

Beginning with the 2007-2008 school year, for school districts that were to receive funding based on a higher or lower percentage tier than the preceding school year, the funding would be increased or reduced in three equal amounts over a three-year period following the year in which a school district's percentage level of NSL students increased or decreased. A school district that has experienced a significant growth, defined by rule as 1%, in enrolled students in each of the previous three years shall receive funding for the expected increase in the number of NSL students based on the three year average growth in enrollment times the percentage of students eligible for NSL Act funding times the appropriate per student funding amount.

NON-TRADITIONAL LICENSURE GRANTS

Non-Traditional Licensure Program (NTLP) was a "Teaching and Learning" Teacher Licensure program for those with a college degree in areas other than education. This program was developed by the Arkansas Legislature for the purpose of meeting teacher shortages in critical parts of the state. Recognizing that professionals' experience, knowledge and previous career successes can positively impact the lives of students, NTLP allows mature career changers, with a variety of work experiences, to teach in public school classrooms. For the 2008-2009 school year, NTLP teachers received up to \$500 for teaching in geographic areas and/or subject areas in which there were critical teacher shortages.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT FUNDING

This program provided a coordinated set of planned learning activities for teachers and administrators that were standards-based. These programs should have resulted in individual, school-wide and system-wide improvements designed to ensure that all students demonstrate proficiency in the state academic standards. For the 2008-2009 school year, the Professional Development Funding amount for a school district was an amount of up to fifty dollars (\$50) times the school district's Average Daily Membership for the previous year. Special language in Act 229 of 2007 allowed the Department of Education to use up to \$4,000,000 to develop a statewide professional development program.

PUBLIC SCHOOL EMPLOYEES INSURANCE

This program paid the Employee Benefits Division (EBD) of the Department of Finance and Administration the monthly health insurance contribution rate of \$131 established by ACA §6-17-1117 for employees of education service cooperatives, vocational centers and the school operated by the Department of Correction. Additionally, the Department of Education transferred \$35 million in eleven equal monthly installments to EBD for public school district employee contributions for each eligible public school district employee who participated in the Arkansas Public School Life and Health Insurance Program.

PYGMALION COMMISSION

This \$40,000 grant to the Fort Smith School District was used to develop statewide alternative learning environments and provide changes in curriculum, instructional approaches, school climate and organization to improve educational outcomes for at-risk students.

RESIDENTIAL CENTERS/JUVENILE DETENTION

This was a special education program to provide reimbursements to school districts for educational costs associated with students in approved residential treatment facilities or juvenile detention centers. By State Board regulation, community residential facilities were reimbursed through local school districts. The maximum amount reimbursed was a standard daily rate that could not exceed the product of a multiplier of 2.10 times the per student foundation aid. When the requests for reimbursement exceed the amount of funds available, the reimbursement will be prorated. Detention facility reimbursement was based on a calculation of foundation aid times the number of approved program beds.

SCHOOL FOOD SERVICES

This program, combined with the Surplus Commodities program, provided the State match for the total school food program in local schools. These grants were paid to school districts at a rate based on the number of lunches served. The rate of \$0.02905818 was established by dividing the state appropriation of \$1,650,000 by the total number of lunches served during the 2008-2009 school year.

SERIOUS OFFENDER PROGRAM

The Department of Education has established the Serious Offender Program (SOP) through a Memorandum of Understanding with the Department of Human Services (DHS). The current program has been in effect since 1996 for the purpose of generating educational funds for the DHS Serious Offender Programs. School districts were provided state funds based on the number of participants in their districts. The amount per student for 2008-2009 was \$5,168. School districts in turn paid the SOP providers in their districts.

SMART START/SMART STEP

The Smart Start program focused on improving the academic achievement of kindergarten through fourth grade students in the areas of reading and mathematics. Since its inception in 2000, this program has been expanded to include Smart Step and Smart Future, which included grades five through twelve. These programs were administered through a network of literacy, mathematics and science specialists who assisted the schools with professional development through on-site technical support, regional workshops, statewide conferences and the internet.

SPECIAL EDUCATION – CATASTROPHIC OCCURRENCES

This program assisted districts with special education students who required extraordinary support services such as full-time registered nurses or elaborate assistance technology. The special education and related services required by these individual students were unduly expensive, extraordinary or beyond the routine costs associated with special education. Reimbursements from this program could only be sought after eligible costs for the child equaled or exceeded \$15,000, and only after Medicaid, federal Title VI-B and available third-party funding was applied to the catastrophic occurrence.

SPECIAL EDUCATION SERVICES

This program provided funding to support the provision of Extended School Year (ESY) services to eligible students with disabilities in need of such services, provided special education services to children with disabilities who were wards of the State placed by the Department of Human Services (DHS) in out-of-state therapeutic treatment programs and provided funds to support the payment of salaries to special education supervisors.

For the 2008-2009 school year, \$3,374,551 was paid to school districts to support the salaries of special education supervisors, at a maximum amount of \$7.30 per student based on the Average Daily Membership of the first three quarters of the previous year. In addition, \$768,416 was paid to school districts and education service cooperatives for ESY services, at a rate of \$74 a day per student.

SPECIAL NEEDS ISOLATED FUNDING

During the 2008-2009 school year, additional funding was provided to school districts which contained isolated schools. As stipulated in ACA §6-20-604, districts had to meet certain eligibility requirements, including involvement in a consolidation or annexation, low student density ratios and certain average daily membership levels.

Pursuant to ACA §6-20-604(h), any funds appropriated for isolated funding and/or special needs isolated funding that remained after the initial distributions, were distributed for transportation costs of isolated schools to school districts eligible to receive special needs isolated funding.

STATE FOUNDATION FUNDING AID

This was typically the largest amount of state financial aid provided to each school district for the 2008-2009 school year. It was computed as the difference between the foundation funding amount of \$5,789, established by the General Assembly pursuant to ACA §6-20-2305(a)(2), times the school district's Average Daily Membership (ADM) for the previous school year, and the sum of ninety-eight percent (98%) of the uniform rate of tax times the property assessment of the school district plus the miscellaneous funds of the school district. The funding for charter schools followed the same formula but used ADM of the current school year. A total of \$1,790,711,431 was distributed as state foundation funding to school districts.

An additional \$39,931,763 was provided to school districts as Enhanced Educational Funding. For the 2008-2009 school year, this funding was calculated by multiplying the school district's ADM of the previous year by \$87.

ADM is the total number of days of school attended plus the total number of days absent by students in grades kindergarten through twelve (K-12) during the first 3 quarters of each school year divided by the number of school days actually taught in the school district during that period of time rounded to the nearest hundredth.

98% UNIFORM RATE OF TAX ACTUAL COLLECTION ADJUSTMENT

For a school district whose net revenues are less than the sum of 98% of the Uniform Rate of Tax (URT) multiplied by the property assessment of the school district, the Arkansas Department of Education (ADE) shall distribute to the school district the difference between the net revenues of the school district and the sum of 98% of the URT multiplied by the property assessment of the school district.

For a school district whose net revenues are more than the sum of 98% of the URT multiplied by the property assessment of the school district, the ADE shall recoup from the school district the difference between the net revenues of the school district and the sum of 98% of the URT multiplied by the property assessment of the school district.

Act 618 of 2009 authorized ADE to return the excess distributions which had been refunded by school districts in the 2007-2008 school year. Also, Act 965 of 2009 enabled ADE to collect excess distributions by withholding funds from a disbursement to the district in the following year.

STUDENT GROWTH

This program provided supplemental funding to school districts that had a growth in students over the previous school year. Student growth funding was calculated as the sum of one quarter of the per student foundation funding for the school district multiplied by the increase (excluding any increase resulting solely from consolidation or annexation), if any, of each of the following:

- (A) The school district's quarterly ADM for the first quarter of the current school year over ADM of the previous school year;
- (B) The school district's quarterly ADM for the second quarter of the current year over the ADM of the previous school year;
- (C) The school district's quarterly ADM for the third quarter of the current school year over the ADM of the previous school year; and
- (D) The school district's quarterly ADM for the fourth quarter of the current school year over the ADM of the previous school year.

As the fourth quarter ADM count was not available until the following school fiscal year, the third distribution included one half of the per student foundation funding for the school district multiplied by the increase, if any, of the school district's quarterly ADM for the third quarter of the current school year over the ADM of the previous school year. As a result of calculating the third distribution, either an adjustment was made at the time of the initial distribution of growth funding for the school district in the following school year based on the actual fourth quarter growth or the school district refunded the overpayment in growth funding.

SUPPLEMENTAL MILLAGE INCENTIVE FUNDING

These funds were distributed in accordance with ACA §6-20-2503(f). Beginning in fiscal year 2005-2006, school districts that elected to receive Supplemental Millage Incentive Funding in fiscal year 2004-2005 received the amount of Supplemental Millage Incentive Funding that exceeded the amount that the school district would have received under Debt Service Funding Supplement and General Facilities Funding in fiscal year 2004-2005. After fiscal year 2005-2006, this funding began a phase out by reducing the amount received by a school district by one-tenth of the 2005-2006 amount each year over a ten-year period with the savings distributed through the Education Facilities Partnership Fund (EFP). The amount of savings transferred in fiscal year 2008-2009 to the Educational Facilities Partnership Fund (EFP) was \$3,020,237.

SURPLUS COMMODITIES

The Department of Human Services (DHS) administered the Surplus Commodities Program for the 2008-2009 school year. Under an agreement with DHS, the Department of Education reimbursed transportation costs of \$630,000 for the delivery of surplus commodities to the school districts.

TEACHER OF THE YEAR

In submitting an application for Arkansas Teacher of the Year, a school district agreed that, if its teacher candidate is selected, the district would have placed the teacher on paid administrative leave for the school year immediately following his or her selection, as provided in ACA §6-17-2504. During the school year in which the school district's teacher of the year was on paid administrative leave, the Department of Education reimbursed the school district for the salaries and benefits of the State Teacher of the Year as provided in ACA §6-17-2505. During this time, the State Teacher of the Year served in an advisory position as a non-voting member on the Arkansas State Board of Education.

TEACHER LICENSURE/MENTORING

This program funded the Arkansas Teacher Induction Program and Administrator Induction Program, which provided Pathwise mentoring for support, retention and professional growth of new teachers and administrators. Under the Pathwise system, first-year teachers and administrators were paired with trained mentors, who helped them through their first one to three years, traditionally the most difficult years.

During the 2008-2009 school year, districts received \$2,000 for each new teacher and \$1,200 for each new administrator participating in the program. School districts then distributed \$1,200 to the new teacher's mentor and \$800 to the new teacher to be used for materials, supplies or professional training. Likewise, the school district distributed \$400 to the new administrator's mentor and \$800 to the new administrator to be used for professional development. Funds were also distributed to school districts, institutions of higher education and education service cooperatives to provide training to mentors. In addition, \$213,000 was paid to Teach for America for recruiting new out of state teachers to Arkansas.

TEACHER RETIREMENT MATCHING

These payments were the employer matching for employees of the education service cooperatives, vocational centers, Arkansas Easter Seals and the school operated by the Department of Correction.

For the 2008-2009 school year, the matching rate was 14% of salaries for all employees, except those who elected the Teacher Deferred Retirement Option Plan (T-DROP) before September 1, 2003. The matching rate for these T-DROP employees was 6%.

TECHNOLOGY GRANTS

This program provided technology grants to education service cooperatives and school districts for programs such as the EAST Initiative and Explor-Net. The EAST program gave students the experience of using technology to solve real-life school or community problems. A National Training Center was established in Little Rock for training facilitators from other states as well as Arkansas teachers and students. Explor-Net taught students computer repair in a hands-on environment and teams, teachers and administrative personnel technology integration.

During the 2008-2009 school year, grants totaling \$1,933,800 were paid to education service cooperatives and institutions for higher education for technology equipment and technology coordinators and \$2,065,620 to Environmental and Spatial Technology, Inc. for training and support of the EAST Initiative in over 170 participating schools. Explor-Net also received funding of \$187,575 for training and support of its program.

TRAVELING TEACHERS

This program assisted school districts in providing appropriately licensed teachers to teach required courses in grades nine through twelve (9 - 12). A "traveling teacher" was a teacher who was appropriately licensed by the Department of Education, had been designated as a highly qualified teacher in the subject area for which he/she was offering instruction and was employed on a full-time equivalent basis by a host school district who desired to provide professional teaching services of the traveling teacher to a receiving school district for one or more required courses. The traveling teacher received reimbursement of travel expenses and a yearly incentive bonus in addition to the compensation provided in the teacher's annual teaching contract with the host school district. The bonus was two thousand dollars (\$2,000) for a semester traveling teacher agreement, or four thousand dollars (\$4,000) for a full year traveling teacher agreement. Two traveling teachers were funded in 2008-2009.

YOUTH SHELTERS

This program partially reimbursed school districts for additional costs of providing educational services to students who were placed in youth shelters by the Department of Human Services.

For the 2008-2009 school year, funds were distributed to school districts using a per student reimbursement rate of \$509. This rate was calculated by dividing the appropriation amount of \$165,000 by the number of available beds in youth shelters.

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ACADEMIC FACILITIES CATASTROPHIC PROGRAM

Act 2206 of 2005, codified as ACA §6-20-2508, created the Academic Facilities Catastrophic Program, which authorized the Division of Public School Academic Facilities and Transportation to distribute assistance to school districts for emergency facility projects due to an act of God or violence that could not have been prevented by reasonable maintenance, repair, or renovation of the building. The law required that any state assistance under this program was to be used to pay the cost of only the portion of a catastrophic project that was not covered by insurance or other public or private emergency assistance received by or payable to the school district. Funding was based on the academic facilities wealth index of the school district.

ACADEMIC FACILITIES PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM

The Academic Facilities Partnership program was promulgated pursuant to Acts 1426 and 2206 of 2005, codified as ACA §6-20-2507. This program provided state financial assistance in the form of cash payments to school districts for eligible new construction projects. A new construction project included any improvement to an academic facility and, if necessary, related areas such as the physical plant and grounds that brought the state of condition or efficiency of the academic facility to a state of condition or efficiency better than the facility's original condition of completeness or efficiency. New construction included additions to existing academic facilities, construction of new academic facilities and projects which correct deficiencies through new construction to maintain a safe, dry and healthy facility. Funding for this program may be carried forward each fiscal year until project completion.

ACADEMIC FACILITIES SAFETY

During the 2008-2009 school year, the Safety Training program was funded \$104,650, which paid \$350 for each bus mechanic to attend an annual workshop.

ACADEMIC FACILITIES TRANSITIONAL REPAIR

The Academic Facilities Transitional Repair Program was promulgated pursuant to Acts 1426 and 2206 of 2005, codified as ACA §6-20-2506. This program provided state financial aid based on an eligible school district's academic facilities wealth index in the form of reimbursement to a school district for eligible new construction projects for which the debt was incurred or funds were spent after January 1, 2005, and on or before June 30, 2006.

Funding for this program may be carried forward to subsequent years until such time as the program is complete. Act 989 of 2007 established that all projects funded under this program must be verified as completed no later than July 1, 2009.

ARKANSAS LEADERSHIP ACADEMY AND MASTER PRINCIPAL

Created by the State Legislature in 1991, the Arkansas Leadership Academy was formed in order to provide leadership for education reform in Arkansas. The Academy brings together partners from business, higher education, professional associations, educational cooperatives and governmental agencies. It provided a variety of leadership development programs for principals, teachers, partners and other leaders including year-long residential programs. The Arkansas Leadership Academy program was appropriated \$1,490,000 for the 2008-2009 school year. Distributions totaling \$900,000 were made to the University of Arkansas from the Department of Education Fund (EGA) for the Arkansas Leadership Academy School Support Program through which the Arkansas Leadership Academy, in collaboration with the Department of Education, provided support to schools or school districts designated as being in school improvement (\$300,000) and for general operations (\$600,000). The Public School Fund (JAA) provided \$500,000 to the University of Arkansas for the master school principal program and bonus distributions totaling \$72,000 to eight master principals who had completed the requirements of the program.

READING RECOVERY/ EARLY LITERACY

Reading Recovery, a research-based approach to reading intervention, in connection with the University of Arkansas at Little Rock (UALR), has been implemented in elementary schools across the state. The Arkansas Department of Education provided schools the opportunity to train Reading Recovery teachers and/or to train a school-based employee to become a Reading Recovery Teacher Leader. Training expenses were funded by ADE through the training center at UALR in the amount of \$100,000 for the 2008-2009 school year. Grant funds provide training and support materials.

SCHOOL DISTRICT MILLAGE ROLLBACK COMPENSATION

These funds were paid to school districts to compensate for loss of revenues resulting from Amendment 79 of the Constitution which equalized school district real and personal property millage rates.

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BYRD HONORS SCHOLARSHIPS (CFDA# 84.185)

This program provided a \$1,500 postsecondary education scholarship to outstanding high school seniors who show promise of continued academic achievement in an effort to recognize and promote student excellence. These scholarships were awarded for a maximum of 4 years and can be used at any eligible institution of higher education.

CENTERS FOR DISEASE CONTROL AND PREVENTION - INVESTIGATIONS AND TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE (CFDA# 93.283)

This program assisted state and local health authorities, as well as public schools, in controlling communicable diseases, chronic diseases and disorders and other preventable health conditions. These objectives were carried out by providing epidemic aid, surveillance, technical assistance, consultation, program support and leadership.

CHARTER SCHOOLS (CFDA# 84.282)

These funds were used to support the planning, development and initial implementation of charter schools.

EDUCATION FOR HOMELESS CHILDREN AND YOUTH (CFDA# 84.196)

This program provided funds to schools for supportive services and activities that facilitate the educational success of homeless children and youth.

EDUCATION TECHNOLOGY STATE GRANTS (CFDA# 84.318)

This program provided funds for schools through competitive grants to improve student academic achievement through the use of technology and to assist students in becoming technologically literate.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE ACQUISITION GRANTS (CFDA# 84.365)

This program provided grants to schools to ensure that limited English proficient children and youth, including immigrant children and youth, obtain English proficiency and meet state academic standards.

EVEN START – STATE EDUCATIONAL AGENCIES (CFDA# 84.213)

This is a Family Literacy program that provided grants to schools for programs designed to improve the educational opportunities of low-income families.

FRESH FRUIT AND VEGETABLE PROGRAM (CFDA# 10.582)

The purpose of the Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program is three-fold: (1) to provide access to fresh fruits and vegetables for students in low income public schools at times other than regular meal periods, (2) to assist local farmers by expanding local markets for locally grown fresh fruits and vegetables, and (3) to create local partnerships between schools and the state agriculture industry.

IMPROVING TEACHER QUALITY STATE GRANTS (CFDA# 84.367)

This program provided grants to school districts to assist schools with effectively recruiting and retaining highly qualified teachers and to provide professional development activities.

LEARN AND SERVE AMERICA – SCHOOL AND COMMUNITY BASED PROGRAMS (CFDA# 94.004)

This program provided grants to schools to offer service-learning opportunities for school-age youth, educate teachers about service-learning and incorporate service-learning opportunities into classrooms.

MATHEMATICS AND SCIENCE PARTNERSHIPS (CFDA# 84.366)

These funds were distributed to various local education agencies, including various school districts and Education Service Cooperatives, and to institutions of higher education. The purpose of the grants was to improve the academic achievement of students in mathematics and science through projects that promoted strong teaching skills for elementary and secondary school teachers and integrated teaching methods based on scientifically based research and technology.

MIGRANT EDUCATION – COORDINATION PROGRAM (CFDA# 84.144)

The purpose of these funds was to provide incentive grants to state educational agencies that participated in high-quality consortia with another state educational agency or other appropriate entity to improve the delivery of services to migrant children whose education was interrupted by addressing key needs of migratory children.

MIGRANT EDUCATION – STATE GRANT PROGRAM (CFDA# 84.011)

These funds supported high quality education programs for migratory children and helped ensure that migratory children who moved among the states were not penalized in any manner by disparities among states in curriculum, graduation requirements, state academic content and/or student academic achievement standards. Funds also ensured that migratory children not only were provided with appropriate education services (including supportive services) that addressed their special needs but also that such children received full and appropriate opportunities to meet the same challenging state academic content and student academic achievement standards that all children were expected to meet.

**NATIONAL SCHOOL BREAKFAST, LUNCH AND SNACK PROGRAMS
(CFDA #10.553, 10.555 and 10.559)**

This program assisted schools in making school breakfasts, lunches and snacks available to all school children and to encourage the domestic consumption of nutritious agricultural commodities.

READING FIRST STATE GRANTS (CFDA# 84.357)

The Reading First program provides assistance to States and districts in establishing reading programs for students in kindergarten through third grade that are based on scientifically based reading research. Reading First also focuses on teacher development and ensuring that all teachers, including special education teachers, have the tools they need to effectively help their students learn to read. The program provides assistance to States and districts in preparing teachers to identify specific reading barriers facing their students to ensure that every student can read at grade level or above by the end of the third grade.

**REVENUE SHARING AND PAYMENTS IN LIEU OF TAXES
(CFDA# 10.665, 12.112 and 15.227)**

The objectives of these federal programs were to share revenues derived from the use of public lands with state, county and local governments and compensate local taxing units for the loss of taxes generated from federally owned lands. Most of these funds were used for the benefit of public schools and public roads in the county in which the federally owned lands were located. Distributions were made in accordance with applicable sections of ACA §19-7-402 through ACA §19-7-802.

RURAL EDUCATION (CFDA# 84.358)

This program provided grants to rural schools to help improve the quality of teaching and learning in those schools.

**SAFE AND DRUG-FREE SCHOOLS AND COMMUNITIES – STATE GRANTS
(CFDA# 84.186)**

This program funded projects that support drug and violence prevention and education activities in schools.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT GRANTS (CFDA# 84.377)

The purpose of this program was to assist states to carry out their program improvement responsibilities required under Sections 1116 and 1117 of Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act by (1) building State capacity to provide leadership in implementing effective school improvement strategies for local educational agencies (LEAs) and schools that have been identified for improvement, are in corrective action, and are in the restructuring process and (2) providing resources to LEAs to support school improvement activities, including the development and implementation of effective restructuring plans.

SPECIAL EDUCATION – GRANTS TO STATES (CFDA# 84.027)

This program provided grants to school districts to assist in providing a free public education to all eligible children with disabilities.

SPECIAL EDUCATION – GRANTS TO STATES, RECOVERY ACT (CFDA# 84.391)

This program, funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, provided grants to school districts to assist in providing a free public education to all eligible children with disabilities.

SPECIAL EDUCATION – PRESCHOOL GRANTS (CFDA# 84.173)

This program provided supplemental grants to school districts and education service cooperatives to assist in providing a free public education to children with disabilities ages 3 through 5 years.

SPECIAL EDUCATION – PRESCHOOL GRANTS, RECOVERY ACT (CFDA# 84.392)

This program, funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, provided supplemental grants to school districts and education service cooperatives to assist in providing a free public education to children with disabilities ages 3 through 5 years.

SPECIAL EDUCATION – STATE PERSONNEL DEVELOPMENT (CFDA# 84.323)

This program assisted state educational agencies in reforming and improving their systems for personnel preparation and professional development of individuals providing early intervention, educational and transition services, to improve results for children with disabilities.

STATE GRANTS FOR INNOVATIVE PROGRAMS (CFDA# 84.298)

This program assisted State and local educational agencies in the reform of elementary and secondary education.

STATEWIDE DATA SYSTEMS (CFDA# 84.372)

This program enabled State educational agencies to design, develop and implement statewide, longitudinal data systems to efficiently and accurately manage, analyze, disaggregate and use individual student data, consistent with the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965. The program in Arkansas was designed to enhance the current data system by adding a unique student identifier process, an electronic transcript system and a data quality program. Arkansas received a grant of approximately \$3,300,000 to implement the system.

TITLE I GRANTS TO LOCAL EDUCATIONAL AGENCIES (CFDA# 84.010)

This program was designed to help schools improve the teaching and learning environment of children failing or most at-risk of failing.

TITLE I GRANTS TO LOCAL EDUCATIONAL AGENCIES, RECOVERY ACT (CFDA# 84.389)

This program, funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, was designed to help schools improve the teaching and learning environment of children failing or most at-risk of failing.

TITLE I NEGLECTED AND DELINQUENT (CFDA #84.013)

The purpose of these funds were (1) to improve educational services to children in local and state institutions for neglected and delinquent children and youth so that such children and youth have the opportunity to meet the same challenging State content standards and challenging State student performance standards that all children in the state were expected to meet; (2) to provide such children and youth the services needed to make a successful transition from institutionalization to further schooling and employment; and (3) to prevent at-risk youth from dropping out of school and provide dropouts and youth returning from institutions with a support system to ensure their continued education.

TWENTY-FIRST CENTURY COMMUNITY LEARNING CENTERS (CFDA# 84.287)

This program provided grants to local educational agencies, faith-based organizations, and community-based entities to create community learning centers that provide academic enrichment opportunities for students attending high-poverty and low-performing schools.

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ALTERNATIVE CERTIFICATION PROGRAM

Non-traditional licensure teachers were assigned to one of nine sites located across Arkansas to complete instructional requirements for the Non-Traditional Licensure Program. (See narrative on Attachment 17.) Grants were provided to the nine non-traditional licensure sites to conduct training from the registration fees remitted by the teachers seeking licensure.

ARKANSAS MEDICAID ADMINISTRATION CLAIMING

The Arkansas Department of Education, Special Education Unit, along with the Department of Human Services - Division of Medical Services, received federal approval from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) to coordinate and manage a statewide Medicaid administrative claiming program referred to as Arkansas Medicaid Administrative Claiming (ARMAC). ARMAC allowed school districts the opportunity to receive reimbursement for the costs associated with certain administrative activities that directly supported the Arkansas Medicaid program. These funds were received from the Arkansas Department of Human Services.

COORDINATED SCHOOL HEALTH

Coordinated School Health was a model that consisted of eight interactive components to connect health and academics. It was based on the idea that schools by themselves cannot and should not be expected to address the nation's most serious health and social problems. It brought together families, health care workers, media, religious organizations, and community organizations that served youth and young people. The schools provided the critical facility in which many agencies might work together to maintain the well-being of young people. These funds were received from the Arkansas Department of Health.

FISH AND WILDLIFE CONSERVATION PROGRAM

These funds were generated from fines and fees collected by the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission arising out of convictions of persons violating state laws protecting game, fish and wildlife. The funds were distributed by the Department of Education back to the counties where the offenses occurred to provide school education programs for fish and wildlife conservation.

GATES FOUNDATION

An award in the amount of \$82,351 was made to the University of Central Arkansas. The purpose of the grant was to develop professional development trainings to meet the components of the endorsements as adopted by the Professional Licensure Board and the State Board of Education for middle grade teachers of Algebra I Grade 8.

GREATER GRADUATION PROJECT

Corporate donors provided \$140,000 to develop programs that help students (especially nontraditional and underserved students) successfully complete high school and prepare them for college or the workforce.

TEACHER OF THE YEAR AWARD

This program distributed awards totaling \$29,000 during the 2008-2009 school year to 15 teachers who were recognized as regional Teacher of the Year winners. These regional winners were selected at the state level from teachers who were nominated by their local school districts. One teacher from each region was selected to receive a \$1,000 cash award. The Arkansas Teacher of the Year winner received an additional \$14,000. These funds were received from the Walton Family Foundation.

WALTON TEACHER ADVANCEMENT PROGRAM (TAP) GRANT

The Walton Family Foundation funded the implementation of a pilot Teacher Advancement Program (TAP), which supports teachers in improving instruction and student achievement through the implementation of multiple career paths, ongoing applied professional growth, instructionally focused accountability and performance-based compensation
