Department of Education Grants Summary For the Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2011

This report is issued under the authority of Ark. Code Ann. § 10-3-2102(f)(1). Specifically, this report was prepared from data contained in the Arkansas Administrative Statewide Information System (AASIS) and provides an overview of education grant funds disbursed to school districts and other organizations. The information contained in this report has not been audited. The methodology used in summarizing this report was uniquely developed to provide the required report to the Arkansas General Assembly and, therefore, is more limited in scope than an audit or attestation engagement performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

The attachments in this report provide listings of the recipients of the various programs funded through the Arkansas Department of Education during the fiscal year ended June 30, 2011. Attachments are organized by classification of recipient (school district, charter school, etc.). Within each attachment, funding is further identified by program. Also included in this report are brief descriptions of programs and resources used to fund education in Arkansas. Grants disbursed from the Department of Education for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2011, are summarized below.

Department of Education Grants Public School Fund (JAA) – Narratives of Programs For the Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2011

ADVANCED PLACEMENT INCENTIVE

The Advanced Placement Incentive Program provided support to establish Advanced Placement (AP) courses that are easily accessible and would prepare students for admission to and success in a postsecondary educational environment. The AP courses and exams provide high school students the opportunity to earn college credit at most colleges and universities. The program paid for professional development support for AP and Pre-AP teachers. AP courses were awarded one-time grants of up to \$1,000 for equipment and materials.

ALTERNATIVE LEARNING

School districts were required to provide an Alternative Learning Environment (ALE) for students who demonstrated an inability to function in the standard learning environment. The ALE program provided educational programs to eligible students in alternative classroom settings, as well as additional services to meet the needs of this group of at-risk students. The Department of Education calculated ALE funds in the 2010-2011 school year by multiplying \$4,063 by the number of identified ALE students enrolled during the previous school year, pursuant to Arkansas law and Department of Education rules.

ALTERNATIVE PAY

The Alternative Pay Program, also known as the Rewarding Excellence in Achievement Program (REAP), was appropriated \$2.5 million in fiscal year 2011. REAP was a pilot program that afforded public school districts and public charter schools the opportunity to develop alternative teacher compensation plans tailored to the public school district's or public charter school's needs to accomplish the following:

- Provide incentives that encourage teachers to improve their knowledge and instructional skills in order to improve student learning.
- Recruit and retain highly qualified teachers.
- Encourage highly qualified teachers to undertake challenging assignments.
- Support teachers' roles in improving students' educational achievements.
- Inform policymakers regarding the potential of a restructured teacher professional pay system to improve student achievement across the State.

ARKANSAS LEADERSHIP ACADEMY AND MASTER PRINCIPAL

Created in 1991, the Arkansas Leadership Academy was formed to provide leadership for education reform in Arkansas. The Academy brings together partners from business, higher education, professional associations, educational cooperatives, and governmental agencies to provide a variety of leadership development programs for principals, teachers, partners, and other leaders, including year-long residential programs.

ASSESSMENT/END OF LEVEL TESTING

This program funded grants to develop and implement alternative assessments required by No Child Left Behind, End-of-Course Exams, and Augmented Benchmark Exams.

BETTER CHANCE GRANTS

Arkansas Better Chance Grants were administered by the Division of Child Care and Early Childhood Education of the Department of Human Services for the purpose of serving educationally deprived children from birth through age 5, excluding those attending kindergarten. Within the Arkansas Better Chance Program is the Arkansas Better Chance for School Success Program, which funds innovative and developmentally appropriate early childhood programs for educationally deprived children ages 3 and 4. For the 2010-2011 school year, the distribution of funds was based on \$4,860 per child for classroom-based programs and \$1,750 per child for home visit programs.

Department of Education Grants Public School Fund (JAA) – Narratives of Programs For the Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2011

BONDED DEBT ASSISTANCE

Formerly known as Debt Service Funding, Bonded Debt Assistance was provided to school districts to offset some of the existing debt burden and to increase the amount of local revenue available for the maintenance and operation of schools. Bonded Debt Assistance funds were to be used solely for the payment of bonded debt.

Pursuant to Ark, Code Ann. § 6-20-2503, the following calculation, which was based on a school district's Principal and Interest Payment Schedule in effect and on file with the Arkansas Department of Education (ADE) on January 1, 2005, was used to determine Bonded Debt Assistance. Each eligible school district's annual debt service payment was reduced by 10%. If a district demonstrated to the Commission for Arkansas Public School Academic Facilities and Transportation that all or a portion of the 10% reduction in its scheduled debt payment was attributable to the support of academic facilities, the Commission reversed all or a portion of the 10% reduction by a percentage proportionate to the amount attributable to academic facilities. The remaining 90% (or greater if a percentage was reversed) of the principal and interest payment was divided by the total assessed value of the district and multiplied by 1,000 to calculate the required debt service mills. This product was multiplied by the State Wealth Index, multiplied by the prior year three-quarter Average Daily Membership (ADM), and multiplied by a funding factor. ADM is the total number of days of school attended plus the total number of days absent by students in grades K through 12 during the first 3 quarters of each school year divided by the number of school days actually taught in the school district during that period of time rounded to the nearest hundredth.

These funds were paid on or before August 1 and February 1 of each year. If a district qualified for Bonded Debt Assistance, the amount of aid was not changed as a result of refunding outstanding bonds in effect and on file with the ADE on January 1, 2005. As the amount of state financial assistance decreases, resulting from reductions in principal and interest payments, bond payoff, and increases in property assessments, the Commission distributes savings to the Educational Facilities Partnership Fund (EFP) in accordance with rules promulgated by the Commission.

CONSOLIDATION INCENTIVE

These funds were paid to each school district that was administratively consolidated or annexed by the Arkansas State Board of Education pursuant to Ark. Code Ann. §§ 6-11-105 and 6-13-1401, as well as applicable rules of the State Board of Education. One hundred percent (100%) of the incentive allowance is added to the school district's aid in the first year of consolidation/annexation. In the second year of consolidation/annexation, the district receives 50% of the consolidation/annexation incentive funding granted the previous year, in addition to other state aid.

CONTENT STANDARDS REVISION

Payments were authorized to reimburse school districts for substitute teachers when the Department of Education requested that regular classroom teachers provide assistance and review various content standards of course development.

COORDINATED SCHOOL HEALTH

The Coordinated School Health model consisted of eight interactive components to connect health and academics based on the idea that schools by themselves cannot and should not be expected to address the nation's most serious health and social problems. The program brought together families, health care workers, media, religious organizations, community organizations that serve youth, and young people. The schools provided the crucial facilities in which many agencies might work together to maintain the well-being of young people. These funds were received from the Arkansas Department of Health.

COURT ORDERED DESEGREGATION

Funds were disbursed by the Department of Education for desegregation expenses as required by court-ordered settlement agreements. Disbursements were based on a series of formulas.

DECLINING ENROLLMENT

This program provided additional funding to school districts with a prior year Average Daily Membership (ADM) that was less than the ADM of the year prior to the previous year. Funding was equal to the difference between the average of the ADM for the two immediately preceding years and the ADM for the previous school year multiplied by \$6,023, the amount of foundation funding per student for 2010-2011. School districts cannot receive both declining enrollment funding and student growth funding. Generally, school districts cannot receive both declining enrollment funding and special needs isolated funding. However, any appropriated and available funds for declining enrollment funding that remained after the initial distributions were prorated and distributed equally to school districts that qualified for both declining enrollment funding and special needs isolated funding. There were no declining enrollment funds remaining in 2010-2011 after the initial distributions.

DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION SCHOOL SYSTEM

Ark. Code Ann. § 12-29-304 provided that the cost of running the Corrections School System be borne by the Department of Correction and the Department of Education.

DISTANCE LEARNING

Distance learning is an educational process used to assist school districts in offering advanced high school courses, Advanced Placement courses, enriched course content, or other academic courses not otherwise available in the school district.

EASTER SEALS

This program funded the cost of educational services provided by the Easter Seal Society to children ages 3 to 21 who have orthopedic and/or communicative disorders. This funding reduced the amount that local school districts had to pay for these educational services and also qualified the facility as "state supported" so that federal funds were available to further reduce the cost to local school districts.

EARLY CHILDHOOD SPECIAL EDUCATION

This program provided special education services to approximately 9,500 children ages 3 through 5 who have disabilities. This program also serves as state Medicaid match for physical, occupational, and speech therapy services. A portion of the appropriation was used to provide for partial reimbursement of 16 Early Childhood Coordinators and certain other program coordination costs.

ECONOMIC EDUCATION

The objective of this program is to increase the economic literacy of pre-K through 12 students by providing economic and personal finance education and training to teachers in Arkansas. Funding was distributed to the Arkansas Council on Economic Education (now conducting business as Economics Arkansas), a private, non-profit organization providing certified professional development for K through 12 teachers.

EDUCATION RENEWAL ZONES

The Arkansas Education Renewal Zones (ERZ) initiative identified and implemented educational and management strategies to improve public school performance and student academic achievement. Through this initiative, regionalized ERZs provided for collaboration among Arkansas's schools, especially smaller schools, while helping to concentrate and coordinate the resources of institutions of higher education, regional education service cooperatives, and other service providers.

EDUCATION SERVICE COOPERATIVES

The 15 Education Service Cooperatives around the State facilitated the sharing of resources and services between local school districts and provided a core support system for professional development.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE LEARNERS

This program served school districts with language minority students with limited English proficiency. Most of these students were at the beginning stages of acquiring English. Funding was provided to assist with securing specially-trained staff, instructional materials, and/or training.

GENERAL FACILITIES FUNDING

These funds were distributed in accordance with Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-2503(e). Beginning in fiscal year 2005-2006, school districts received all or a portion of the amount of General Facilities Funding that the district received or would have received under the Supplemental School District Funding Act of 2003 in fiscal year 2004-2005. After fiscal year 2005-2006, this funding began to be phased out, as the amount received by a school district was reduced by one-tenth of the 2005-2006 amount each year over a 10-year period with the savings distributed through the Education Facilities Partnership Fund (EFP).

GIFTED AND TALENTED

This program provided salary support for Gifted and Talented supervisors in the education service cooperatives, a contribution to Hendrix College for the Arkansas Governor's School, awards for winners of the Outstanding Gifted and Talented Award program, and other contributions.

GRANTS TO SCHOOL DISTRICTS

This payment reimbursed the Ozark Mountain School District for the cost of educating students in North Arkansas who could not get to their assigned district because the location of. Bull Shoals Lake created a round trip between their homes and district of more than 35 miles.

HIGH PRIORITY DISTRICT TEACHER RECRUITMENT AND RETENTION

As authorized by Ark. Code Ann. § 6-17-811, these grants provided teacher bonuses as incentives for recruitment and retention in high-priority districts (i.e., districts having at least 80% free or reduced lunches and 1,000 or fewer students). "Teachers" were defined as those working directly with students 70% of their time in a classroom setting and included guidance counselors and librarians.

For all newly signed teachers in high-priority districts, a one-time signing bonus of \$5,000 was paid at the completion of a full year of teaching, and a \$4,000 retention bonus was paid at the end of the next two subsequent years if the teacher continued teaching in the same high-priority district. A newly signed teacher was also eligible for a \$3,000 retention bonus, which was paid at the end of the fourth year and each subsequent year if the teacher continued teaching in the same high-priority district or another high-priority district. For all teachers not newly signed to work in the district, a \$3,000 retention bonus was paid at the end of each year if the teacher continued to work in a high-priority district.

HOME SCHOOL TESTING

This program paid for the administration of norm-referenced achievement tests for home schooled students, as required by Ark. Code Ann. § 6-15-504.

HUMAN DEVELOPMENT CENTER EDUCATION AID

This program provided funding for educational services to the children in the State's Human Development Centers. Act 1421 of 2009 appropriated \$526,150 and was fully disbursed to the Department of Human Services

INTERVENTION BLOCK GRANTS

Local school districts, education service cooperatives, institutions of higher education, and other organizations were eligible to apply for an Intervention Block Grant. These grants were used to encourage parental involvement through the following four student competitions: Arkansas Governor's Quiz Bowl, State History Day Competition, Creativity in Arkansas, and Arkansas Destination Imagination.

ISOLATED FUNDING

Because of location or geographic barriers, some school districts contained an area that was not able to share resources or had unusual transportation needs. Such areas with an Average Daily Membership (ADM) of less than 350 are termed "isolated school areas," and the districts that contained such areas received additional funding. Isolated funding for isolated school districts was provided in the 2010-2011 school year in accordance with Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-601. The funding was distributed based upon the prior year three-quarter ADM of the isolated school area multiplied by the per student isolated funding amount for the isolated school area as prescribed by Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-603.

NATIONAL BOARD FOR PROFESSIONAL TEACHING STANDARDS

This program encouraged teachers to seek certification by the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards by competitively awarding the \$2,500 application fee and up to three days of substitute teacher pay. A \$5,000 initial bonus was awarded during the school year in which the individual first obtained National Board certification, and a yearly bonus of \$5,000 was awarded to certified teachers in each of years 2 through 10 of the 10-year life of the certificate. Funding was also distributed to designated candidate "support centers" at various school districts, education service cooperatives, or institutions of higher education to assist candidates with the National Board certification process. Support center location funding was based on candidate distribution throughout the State. Teachers who do not achieve certification during the required three years must refund all state funds expended on their behalf.

NATIONAL SCHOOL LUNCH STUDENT FUNDING

This program provided state categorical funding for those students from low socio-economic backgrounds, as indicated by the prior year eligibility for free or reduced-price meals under the National School Lunch (NSL) Act, as reported on October 1 of each year and submitted to the Department of Education.

For the 2010-2011 school year, NSL funding was divided into three tiers. Beginning with the 2007-2008 school year, for school districts that were to receive funding based on a higher or lower percentage tier than the preceding school year, funding was increased or reduced in three equal amounts over a three-year period following the year in which a district's percentage level of NSL students increased or decreased. A school district that had experienced significant growth (defined as 1%) in enrolled students in each of the previous three years received funding for the expected increase in the number of NSL students based on the three-year average growth in enrollment multiplied by the percentage of students eligible for NSL funding multiplied by the appropriate per student funding amount.

98% UNIFORM RATE OF TAX ACTUAL COLLECTION ADJUSTMENT

For a school district whose net revenues were <u>less</u> than the sum of 98% of the Uniform Rate of Tax (URT) multiplied by the property assessment of the school district, the Arkansas Department of Education (ADE) distributed to the district the difference between the net revenues of the district and the sum of 98% of the URT multiplied by the property assessment of the district.

For a school district whose net revenues were <u>more</u> than the sum of 98% of the URT multiplied by the property assessment of the district, the ADE recouped from the school district the difference between the net revenues of the district and the sum of 98% of the URT multiplied by the property assessment of the district. Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-2305(a)(4) enabled ADE to collect excess distributions by withholding funds from disbursements to the district in the following year.

NON-TRADITIONAL LICENSURE GRANTS

The Non-Traditional Licensure Program (NTLP) was a "teaching and learning" teacher licensure program for those with a college degree in areas other than education. This program was developed by the Arkansas Legislature for the purpose of meeting teacher shortages in critical parts of the State. Recognizing that professionals' experience, knowledge, and previous career successes can positively impact the lives of students, NTLP allows mature career changers with a variety of work experiences to teach in public school classrooms. For the 2010-2011 school year, NTLP teachers received up to \$500 for teaching in geographic areas and/or subject areas with critical teacher shortages.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT FUNDING

This program provided a standards-based set of planned learning activities for teachers and administrators. These programs should have resulted in individual, school-wide, and system-wide improvements designed to ensure that all students demonstrate proficiency in state academic standards. For the 2010-2011 school year, the Professional Development Funding amount for a school district was an amount of up to \$50 multiplied by the school district's Average Daily Membership for the previous year. Special language in Act 293 of 2010 allowed the Department of Education to use up to \$4 million to develop a statewide professional development program.

PUBLIC SCHOOL EMPLOYEES' INSURANCE

This program paid the Employee Benefits Division (EBD) of the Department of Finance and Administration the monthly health insurance contribution rate of \$131 per employee, as established by Ark. Code Ann. § 6-17-1117, for employees of education service cooperatives, vocational centers, and the Department of Correction school . As authorized by Act 293 of 2010, the Department of Education also paid EBD \$15 million in additional health insurance contributions.

RESIDENTIAL CENTERS/JUVENILE DETENTION

This special education program provides reimbursements to school districts for educational costs associated with students in approved residential treatment facilities or juvenile detention centers. By State Board regulation, community residential treatment facilities were reimbursed through local school districts. When the requests for reimbursement exceeded the amount of funds available, the reimbursements were prorated. Detention facility reimbursement was based on a calculation of the rate of foundation aid multiplied by the number of approved program beds.

SCHOOL FACILITY JOINT USE SUPPORT

The School Facility Joint Use Support program was created as a part of the Health Care Initiative of 2009. Funding was provided by General Revenue generated by a cigarette tax increase enacted during the Regular Session of the 87th General Assembly. The intent of the program is to encourage schools to allow their physical plants, both indoor and outdoor, to be used by the public and by community members as accessible and safe environments for community and family activities.

SCHOOL FOOD SERVICES

Combined with the Surplus Commodities program, the School Food Services program provided the State match for the total school food program in local schools. These grants were paid to school districts at a rate based on the number of lunches served.

SERIOUS OFFENDER PROGRAM

The Department of Education established the Juvenile Treatment Centers Program (formerly the Serious Offender Program) through a Memorandum of Understanding with the Department of Human Services, Division of Youth Services (DYS). The current program has been in effect since 1996 for the purpose of generating educational funds for the DYS Juvenile Treatment Centers (JTC) program. School districts were provided State funds based on the number of JTC participants in their districts. In turn, school districts paid the JTC providers in their districts.

SMART START/SMART STEP

The Smart Start program focused on improving the reading and math achievement of students in grades K through 4. Since its inception in 2000, this program has been expanded to include Smart Step and Smart Future, which cover grades 5 through 12. These programs were administered through a network of literacy, mathematics, and science specialists who assisted the schools with professional development through on-site technical support, regional workshops, statewide conferences, and the internet.

SPECIAL EDUCATION - CATASTROPHIC OCCURRENCES

This program assisted districts with special education students who required extraordinary support services, such as full-time registered nurses or elaborate assistive technology. The special education and related services required by these individual students were unduly expensive or beyond the routine costs associated with special education. Reimbursements from this program could be sought after eligible costs for the child equaled or exceeded \$15,000 and only after Medicaid, federal Title VI-B, and available third-party funding were applied to the catastrophic occurrence.

SPECIAL EDUCATION SERVICES

This program provided funding to support the provision of Extended School Year (ESY) services to eligible students with disabilities, special education services to children with disabilities who were wards of the State placed by the Department of Human Services (DHS) in out-of-state therapeutic treatment programs, and salaries to special education supervisors. For the 2010-2011 school year, funding was provided to school districts to support the salaries of special education supervisors based on the Average Daily Membership of the first three quarters of the previous year. In addition, funding was provided to school districts and education service cooperatives for ESY services.

SPECIAL NEEDS ISOLATED FUNDING

This program provided additional funding to school districts that contained isolated school areas and met criteria for small school district funding. As stipulated in Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-604, school districts containing isolated school areas had to meet certain eligibility requirements, including involvement in a consolidation or annexation, low student density ratios, and certain Average Daily Membership levels. Pursuant to Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-604(h), any funds appropriated for isolated funding and/or special needs isolated funding that remained after the initial distributions were equally divided and distributed among school districts that received isolated special needs funding, other than small school funding to be used for transportation costs in isolated school areas.

STATE FOUNDATION FUNDING AID

For the 2010-2011 school year, State Foundation Funding Aid was computed as the difference between the foundation funding amount per student of \$6,023, established by the General Assembly pursuant to Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-2305(a)(2), multiplied by the school district's Average Daily Membership (ADM) for the previous school year, and the sum of 98% of the Uniform Rate of Tax multiplied by the property assessment of the district plus the calculated average miscellaneous funds of the district. The funding for charter schools used the same amount of per-student foundation funding but used the ADM of the prior or current school year as required by law. A total of \$1,777,294,054 was distributed as state foundation funding to school districts, and \$35,551,132 in state foundation funding was distributed to open-enrollment charter schools.

ADM is the total number of days of school attended plus the total number of days absent by students in grades K through 12 during the first 3 quarters of each school year divided by the number of school days actually taught in the school district during that period of time rounded to the nearest hundredth.

STUDENT GROWTH

This program provided supplemental funding to school districts with growth in student enrollment over the previous school year. Student growth funding was calculated as the sum of one quarter of the per-student foundation funding for the school district multiplied by the increase (excluding any increase resulting solely from consolidation or annexation), if any, of each of the following:

- The school district's quarterly Average Daily Membership (ADM) for the first quarter
 of the current school year over the ADM of the previous school year.
- The school district's quarterly ADM for the second quarter of the current year over the ADM of the previous school year.
- The school district's quarterly ADM for the third quarter of the current school year over the ADM of the previous school year.
- The school district's quarterly ADM for the fourth quarter of the current school year over the ADM of the previous school year.

SUPPLEMENTAL MILLAGE INCENTIVE FUNDING

These funds were distributed in accordance with Ark. Code Ann. § 6-20-2503(f). Beginning in fiscal year 2005-2006, school districts that elected to receive Supplemental Millage Incentive Funding in fiscal year 2004-2005 received the amount of funding that exceeded the amount that the district would have received under Debt Service Funding Supplement and General Facilities Funding in fiscal year 2004-2005. After fiscal year 2005-2006, this funding began to be phased out, as the amount received by a school district was reduced by one-tenth of the 2005-2006 amount each year over a 10-year period with the savings distributed through the Education Facilities Partnership Fund.

SURPLUS COMMODITIES

The Department of Human Services (DHS) administers the Surplus Commodities program. Under an agreement with DHS, the Department of Education reimbursed transportation costs for the delivery of surplus commodities to school districts.

TEACHER OF THE YEAR

By submitting an application for Arkansas Teacher of the Year, a school district agreed that, if its teacher candidate were selected, the district would place the teacher on paid administrative leave for the school year immediately following his or her selection, as provided in Ark. Code Ann. § 6-17-2504. During the school year in which the Teacher of the Year was on paid administrative leave, the Department of Education would reimburse the district for the salary and benefits of the Teacher of the Year, as provided in Ark. Code Ann. § 6-17-2505. During this time, the Teacher of the Year would serve in an advisory position as a non-voting member on the Arkansas State Board of Education.

TEACHER LICENSURE/MENTORING

This program funded the Arkansas Teacher Induction Program and Administrator Induction Program, which provided Pathwise mentoring for support, retention, and professional growth of new teachers and administrators. Under the Pathwise system, first-year teachers and administrators were paired with trained mentors, who helped them through their first one to three years, traditionally the most difficult.

Districts received funding for each new teacher and new administrator participating in the program. School districts then distributed a portion of the funding to the new teacher's or administrator's mentor. The remaining amount was disbursed to the new teacher for materials, supplies, and/or professional training. Likewise, the portion remaining for the new administrator was used for professional development. Funds were also distributed to school districts, institutions of higher education, and education service cooperatives to provide training to mentors.

TEACHER RETIREMENT MATCHING

These payments consisted of employer matching payments for employees of the education service cooperatives, vocational centers, Easter Seals, and the Department of Correction school. The matching rate was 14% of salaries for all employees.

TECHNOLOGY GRANTS

This program provided technology grants to education service cooperatives and school districts for programs such as the EAST Initiative and Explor-Net. The EAST program gave students the experience of using technology to solve real-life school or community problems. A National Training Center was established in Little Rock for training facilitators from other states as well as Arkansas teachers and students. Explor-Net teaches students computer repair in a hands-on environment and offers teachers and administrators instruction in technology integration.

WORKERS' COMPENSATION

These funds were paid to the Public Employees Claims Division of the Arkansas Insurance Department to cover the costs of worker compensation claims by public school employees during the 2009-2010 school year.

YOUTH SHELTERS

This program partially reimbursed school districts for additional costs of providing educational services to students who were placed in emergency youth shelters by the Department of Human Services. For the 2010-2011 school year, funds were distributed to applicable school districts with youth shelters using a calculation of the appropriated amount divided by the number of available beds in designated youth shelters.

ACADEMIC FACILITIES PARTNERSHIP PROGRAM

The Academic Facilities Partnership Program was promulgated pursuant to Acts 1426 and 2206 of 2005, codified as Ark. Code Ann, § 6-20-2507. This program provided state financial assistance in the form of cash payments to school districts for eligible new construction projects. A new construction project included any improvement to an academic facility and, if necessary, related areas, such as the physical plant and grounds, that improved the facility's completeness or efficiency. New construction included additions to existing academic facilities, construction of new academic facilities, and new construction, all to maintain safe, dry, and healthy facilities. Funding for this program may be carried forward each fiscal year until project completion.

ACADEMIC FACILITIES SAFETY TRAINING GRANTS

During the 2010-2011 school year, the Safety Training program disbursed \$900 to school districts at a rate of \$175 for each bus mechanic who attended an annual workshop. The program was phased out during fiscal year 2011.

ARKANSAS LEADERSHIP ACADEMY AND MASTER PRINCIPAL

Created in 1991, the Arkansas Leadership Academy was formed to provide leadership for education reform in Arkansas. The Academy brings together partners from business, higher education, professional associations, educational cooperatives, and governmental agencies to provide a variety of leadership development programs for principals, teachers, partners, and other leaders including year-long residential programs.

ARKANSAS SCIENCE FAIR ASSOCATION

Act 1065 of 2009 authorized a \$25,000 appropriation to provide operating funds for the Arkansas Science Fair Association. Approximately 75% of the funding was distributed in fiscal year 2010 school year, and the remaining 25% was distributed in fiscal year 2011.

CONTINUING EDUCATION

Act 1750 of 2007 authorized an appropriation of general improvement funds for \$20,000 to provide adult education classes and the Workforce Alliance for Growth in the Economy (WAGE) to the employees of Pepper Source, Ltd., in Crawford County through the Crawford County Adult Education Center.

READING RECOVERY/EARLY LITERACY

Reading Recovery, a research-based approach to reading intervention in connection with the University of Arkansas at Little Rock (UALR), has been implemented in elementary schools across the State. The Arkansas Department of Education provided schools the opportunity to train Reading Recovery teachers and/or a school-based employee to become a Reading Recovery Teacher leader. Training expenses and support materials were funded by ADE through the training center at UALR in the amount of \$100,000 for the 2010-2011 school year.

SCHOOL DISTRICT MILLAGE ROLLBACK COMPENSATION

These funds were paid to school districts to compensate for loss of revenues resulting from Amendment 79 of the Constitution, which equalized school district real and personal property millage rates.

SCHOOL BUS SAFETY EQUIPMENT

The School Bus Safety Equipment grant was established by Act 1207 of 2009. A one-time disbursement of \$49,450 was made for purchase and installation of security camera systems on school buses.

BYRD HONORS SCHOLARSHIPS (CFDA# 84.185)

In an effort to recognize and promote student excellence, this program provided a \$1,500 postsecondary education scholarship to outstanding high school seniors who show promise of continued academic achievement. These scholarships were awarded for a maximum of 4 years and can be used at any eligible institution of higher education.

CENTERS FOR DISEASE CONTROL AND PREVENTION - INVESTIGATIONS AND TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE (CFDA# 93.938)

This program assisted state and local health authorities, as well as public schools, in controlling communicable diseases, chronic diseases and disorders, and other preventable health conditions by providing epidemic aid, surveillance, technical assistance, consultation, program support, and leadership.

CHARTER SCHOOLS (CFDA# 84.282)

These funds were used to support the planning, development, and initial implementation of charter schools.

CHILD NUTRITION DISCRETIONARY GRANTS LIMITED AVAILABILITY (CFDA# 10.579)

This program provided equipment grants for certain equipment purchases at eligible school food authorities.

EDUCATION FOR HOMELESS CHILDREN AND YOUTH (CFDA# 84.196)

This program provided funds to schools for supportive services and activities that facilitate the educational success of homeless children and youth.

ARRA - EDUCATION FOR HOMELESS CHILDREN AND YOUTH (CFDA# 84.387)

Funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, this program provided funds to schools for supportive services and activities that facilitate the educational success of homeless children and youth.

ARRA – EDUCATION JOBS FUND (CFDA# 84.410)

Funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, this program provided funds to local educational agencies for compensation, benefits, and other expenses (such as support services necessary to retain existing employees, to recall or rehire former employees, and to hire new employees) in order to provide early childhood, elementary, or secondary educational and related services.

EDUCATION TECHNOLOGY STATE GRANTS (CFDA# 84.318)

This program provided funds for schools through competitive grants to improve student academic achievement through the use of technology and to assist students in becoming technologically literate.

ARRA – EDUCATION TECHNOLOGY STATE GRANTS (CFDA# 84.386)

Funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, this program provided funds for schools through competitive grants to improve student academic achievement through the use of technology and to assist students in becoming technologically literate.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE ACQUISITION GRANTS (CFDA# 84.365)

This program provided grants to schools to ensure that limited English proficient children and youth, including immigrant children and youth, obtain English proficiency and meet state academic standards.

EVEN START - STATE EDUCATIONAL AGENCIES (CFDA# 84.213)

This program provided funding to help break the cycle of poverty and illiteracy and improve the educational opportunities of low-income families by integrating early childhood education, adult literacy or adult basic education, and parenting education into a unified family literacy program.

FRESH FRUIT AND VEGETABLE PROGRAM (CFDA# 10.582)

The purpose of the Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Program was to provide access to fresh fruits and vegetables for students in low income public schools at times other than regular meal periods. In addition, the program assisted local farmers by expanding local markets for locally grown fresh fruits and vegetables and creating local partnerships between schools and the State agriculture industry.

IMPROVING TEACHER QUALITY STATE GRANTS (CFDA# 84.367)

This program provided grants to school districts to assist with effectively recruiting and retaining highly qualified teachers and to provide professional development activities.

MATHEMATICS AND SCIENCE PARTNERSHIPS (CFDA# 84.366)

The purpose of these grants was to improve the academic achievement of students in mathematics and science through projects that promoted strong teaching skills for elementary and secondary school teachers and integrated teaching methods based on scientific research and technology. These funds were distributed to various local educational agencies, including school districts and education service cooperatives, and institutions of higher education.

MIGRANT EDUCATION - COORDINATION PROGRAM (CFDA# 84.144)

The purpose of these funds was to provide incentive grants to state educational agencies that participated in high-quality consortia with another state educational agency or appropriate entity to improve the delivery of services to migrant children whose education was interrupted by addressing their primary needs.

MIGRANT EDUCATION - STATE GRANT PROGRAM (CFDA# 84.011)

These funds supported high quality education programs for migratory children and helped ensure that they were not penalized due to disparities among states in curriculum, graduation requirements, state academic content, and/or student academic achievement standards. Funds ensured that migratory children not only were provided appropriate education services (including supportive services) that addressed their special needs but also received full and appropriate opportunities to meet the same challenging state academic content and student academic achievement standards that all children were expected to meet.

NATIONAL SCHOOL BREAKFAST AND LUNCH PROGRAMS (CFDA #10.553 & 10.555)

This program assisted schools in making school breakfasts, lunches, and snacks available to all school children and to encourage the domestic consumption of nutritious agricultural commodities.

READING FIRST STATE GRANTS (CFDA# 84.357)

Based on scientific reading research, the Reading First Program assists states and districts in establishing reading programs for students in grades K through 3. The program focuses on teacher development and ensures that all teachers, including special education teachers, have the tools they need to effectively help their students learn to read. The program also assists states and districts in preparing teachers to identify specific reading barriers facing their students to ensure that every student can read at grade level or above by the end of the third grade.

RURAL EDUCATION (CFDA# 84.358)

This program provided grants to rural schools to help improve the quality of teaching and learning in those schools.

SAFE AND DRUG-FREE SCHOOLS AND COMMUNITIES - STATE GRANTS (CFDA# 84.186)

This program funded projects supporting drug and violence prevention and educational activities in schools.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT GRANTS (CFDA# 84.377)

The purpose of this program was to assist states in carrying out their program improvement responsibilities required under Sections 1116 and 1117 of Title I of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act by building State capacity to provide leadership in implementing effective school improvement strategies for local educational agencies (LEAs) and schools that have been identified for improvement, are in corrective action, and are in the restructuring process and by providing resources to LEAs to support school improvement activities, including the development and implementation of effective restructuring plans.

ARRA – SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT GRANTS (CFDA# 84.388)

Funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, this program supported competitive sub-grants to local educational agencies (LEAs) demonstrating the greatest need for the funds and the strongest commitment to use the funds to provide resources to substantially raise the achievement of students in their lowest-performing schools. Priority is given to LEAs with Title I eligible schools ranked in the bottom 5% of such schools, based on student achievement and lack of progress in improving student achievement, as well as secondary schools with a graduation rate below 60% over a number of years. LEAs seeking funding to serve such schools must implement one of four school intervention models: turnaround model, restart model, school closure, or transformation model.

SPECIAL EDUCATION - GRANTS TO STATES (CFDA# 84.027)

This program provided grants to school districts to assist in providing a free public education to all eligible children with disabilities.

ARRA - SPECIAL EDUCATION - GRANTS TO STATES (CFDA# 84.391)

Funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, this program provided grants to school districts to assist in providing a free public education to all eligible children with disabilities.

SPECIAL EDUCATION – PRESCHOOL GRANTS (CFDA# 84.173)

This program provided supplemental grants to school districts and education service cooperatives to assist in providing a free public education to children ages 3 through 5 with disabilities.

ARRA – SPECIAL EDUCATION – PRESCHOOL GRANTS (CFDA# 84.392)

Funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, this program provided supplemental grants to school districts and education service cooperatives to assist in providing a free public education to children ages 3 through 5 with disabilities.

SPECIAL EDUCATION – STATE PERSONNEL DEVELOPMENT (CFDA# 84.323)

This program assisted state educational agencies in reforming and improving their systems for personnel preparation and professional development of individuals providing early intervention, educational, and transition services to children with disabilities.

ARRA – STATE FISCAL STABILIZATION FUND – EDUCATION STATE GRANTS (CFDA# 84.394)

Funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, this program provided funds to local educational agencies (LEAs) for activities authorized under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, the Adult and Family Literacy Act, and the Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Act of 2006. LEAs could use the funds for new construction, modernization, renovation, and repair.

ARRA - STATE FISCAL STABILIZATION FUND - GOVERNMENT SERVICES (CFDA# 84.397)

Funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, this program provided funds to local educational agencies (LEAs) for activities authorized under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act, the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, the Adult and Family Literacy Act, and the Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Act of 2006. LEAs could use the funds for new construction, modernization, renovation, and repair.

STATEWIDE DATA SYSTEMS (CFDA# 84.372)

This program enabled state educational agencies to design, develop, and implement statewide, longitudinal data systems to efficiently and accurately manage, analyze, disaggregate, and use individual student data consistent with the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965. In Arkansas, the program was designed to enhance the current data system by adding a unique student identifier process, an electronic transcript system, and a data quality program. Arkansas received a grant of approximately \$4.96 million to implement the system.

ARRA – STATEWIDE DATA SYSTEMS (CFDA# 84.384)

Funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, this program was intended to assist with the creation of a comprehensive P-20 system that permits the generation and use of accurate and timely data, supports analysis and informed decision-making at all levels of the education system, increases the efficiency with which data may be analyzed to support the continuous improvement of education services and outcomes, facilitates research to improve student academic achievement and close achievement gaps, supports education accountability systems, and simplifies the processes used by the Arkansas Department of Education to make education data transparent through federal and public reporting.

TITLE I GRANTS TO LOCAL EDUCATIONAL AGENCIES (CFDA# 84.010)

This program was designed to help schools improve the teaching and learning environment of children failing or most at-risk of failing.

ARRA - TITLE I GRANTS TO LOCAL EDUCATIONAL AGENCIES (CFDA# 84,389)

Funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, this program was designed to help schools improve the teaching and learning environment of children failing or most at-risk of failing.

TITLE I NEGLECTED AND DELINQUENT (CFDA #84.013)

The purpose of these funds was to improve educational services in local and state institutions for neglected and delinquent children and youth so that they had the opportunity to meet the same challenging state content and student performance standards that all children in the State were expected to meet; to provide such children and youth the services needed to make a successful transition from institutionalization to further schooling and employment; to prevent at-risk youth from dropping out of school; and to provide dropouts and youth returning from institutions with a support system to ensure their continued education.

TWENTY-FIRST CENTURY COMMUNITY LEARNING CENTERS (CFDA# 84.287)

This program provided grants to local educational agencies, faith-based organizations, and community-based entities to create community learning centers providing academic enrichment opportunities for students attending high-poverty and low-performing schools.

ALTERNATIVE CERTIFICATION PROGRAM

Non-traditional licensure teachers were assigned to one of nine sites located across Arkansas to complete instructional requirements for the Non-Traditional Licensure Program. (See narrative in Attachment 9.) From the registration fees remitted by the teachers seeking licensure, grants were provided to the nine non-traditional licensure sites to conduct training.

ARKANSAS MEDICAID ADMINISTRATION CLAIMING

The Arkansas Department of Education, Special Education Unit, along with the Department of Human Services – Division of Medical Services, received federal approval from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services to coordinate and manage a statewide Medicaid administrative claiming program referred to as Arkansas Medicaid Administrative Claiming (ARMAC). ARMAC allowed school districts the opportunity to receive reimbursement for the costs associated with certain administrative activities that directly support the Arkansas Medicaid program. These funds were received from the Arkansas Department of Human Services.

COORDINATED SCHOOL HEALTH GRANT

The Office of Coordinated School Health (CSH) provided funds to the UAMS Arkansas Center for Health Improvement to compile data from CSH school district sites in Arkansas. The data collected will be disseminated to the CSH sites as well as stakeholders throughout Arkansas.

FISH AND WILDLIFE CONSERVATION PROGRAM

These funds were generated from fines and fees collected by the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission arising out of convictions of persons violating state laws protecting game, fish, and wildlife. The funds were distributed by the Department of Education back to the counties where the offenses occurred to provide school education programs for fish and wildlife conservation.

GATES DATA GRANT

The Gates Data Grant of \$200,000 was awarded to the Arkansas Department of Education primarily to develop a method and policy regarding "Teacher of Record" when linking student data to the educator responsible for the student's instruction. The grant included funds to work with teachers from a few districts in the State and also to work with other states that received similar grants. A definition and process for verifying the student rosters are scheduled for completion in Fall 2011.

GREATER GRADUATION PROJECT

Corporate donors provided \$140,000 to develop programs to help students (especially nontraditional and underserved students) successfully complete high school and to prepare them for college or the workforce.

NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF STATE BOARDS OF EDUCATION (NASBE) GRANT

The NASBE grant supports creating a healthy school environment for all students. The grant funds five school districts at \$2,500 each for a total of \$12,500 to develop and implement a school garden. The expected outcome of this effort is to help schools provide fresh fruits and vegetables to the students and ultimately increase the amount of produce that students eat each day.

TEACHER HOUSING

Funding transferred from the Arkansas Department of Education Public School Fund supplemented 22 rental agreements and four house down payments, as allowed by the Arkansas Teacher Housing Development Act.

TEACHER OF THE YEAR AWARD

This program distributed awards to teachers who were recognized as regional Teacher of the Year winners. These regional winners were selected at the State level from teachers who were nominated by their local school districts. One teacher from each region was selected to receive a \$1,000 cash award. The Arkansas Teacher of the Year winner received an additional \$14,000. These funds were received from the Walton Family Foundation.
